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I. Overview of the research:

Research method and scope

1. Research Method:

- Self-Administered Questionnaire Survey: Conducted with 706 high school students from two school locations: one rural and one urban.
- In-Depth Interviews and Group Discussions: Complementary qualitative methods to gather more detailed insights.

2. Research Scope:

Conflict Areas: The study focuses on various conflict areas, including:

- Academic Issues: Concerns related to academic chores, studying at home, extra classes, and school choices.
- Personal Life: Issues regarding Internet usage, socializing with friends, and choosing friends.
- Financial Independence: Topics such as part-time work, money management, and spending money.

Research Content: The aim is to identify areas where conflicts occur without examining the behaviors and manifestations of conflict.

- Perspective on Conflict: Conflict is assessed based on the perceptions of minors, without comparison to parental opinions.

1. Percentage of adolescents having conflicts with parents in areas of study

Studying at home

Conflict with father: 54,6%
Conflict with mother: 63,3%

Academic chores

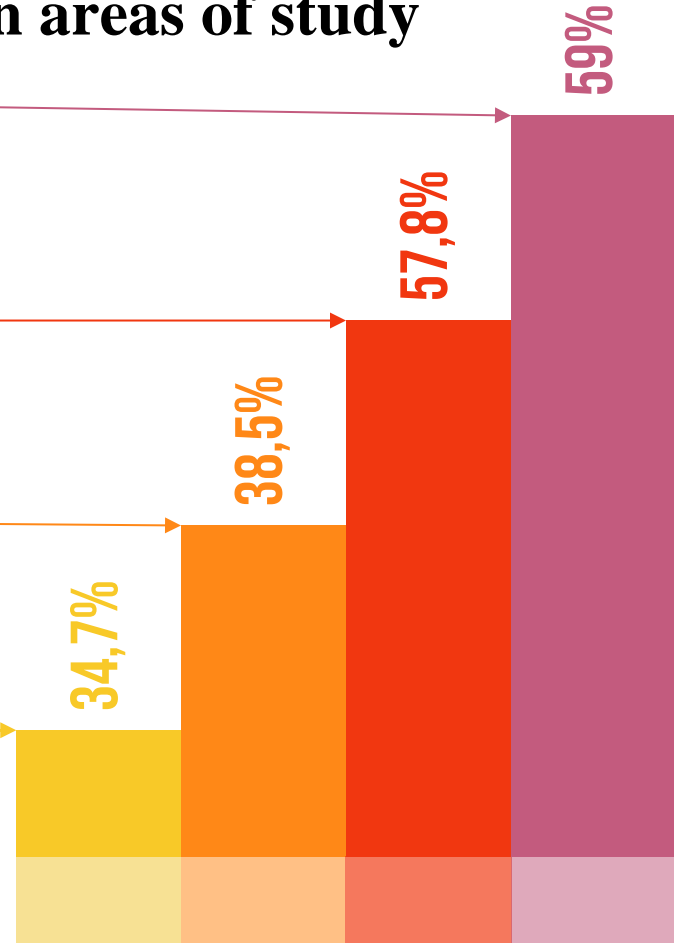
Conflict with father : 52,5%

Extra classes

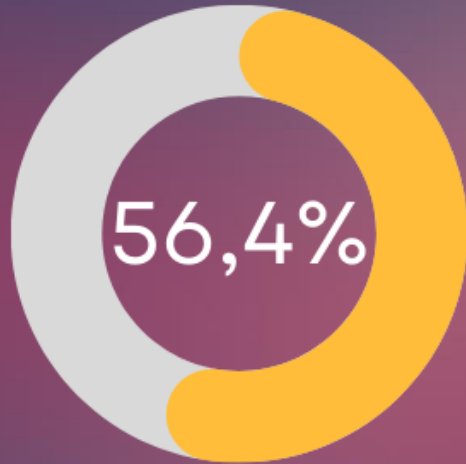
Conflict with father : 34,8%

School choices

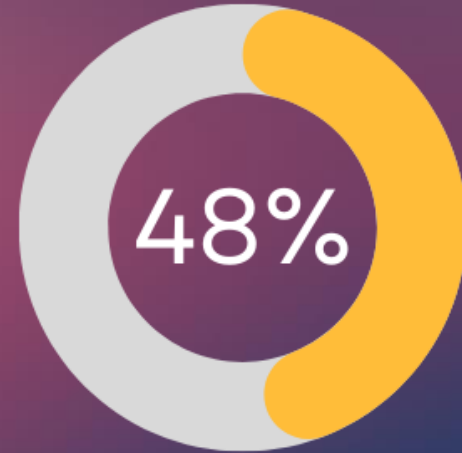
Conflict with father : 31,9%

Adolescent, Parents and Academic Pressure



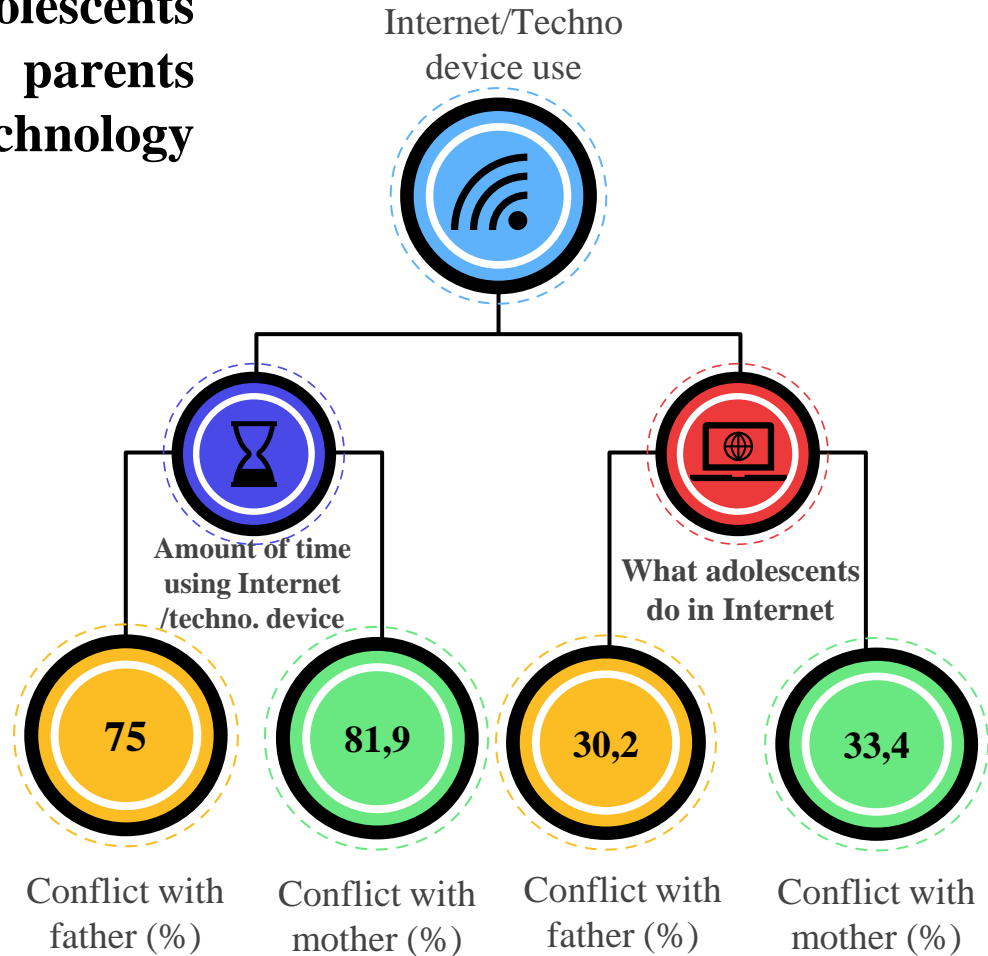
PERCENTAGE OF ADOLESCENTS

2. Percentage of adolescents experiencing conflicts with parents regarding Internet and technology device use.

- ❖ The vast majority of adolescents have access to the Internet at home. Approximately 40% use the Internet freely or very freely.
- ❖ Moreover, over 96% of the children surveyed own at least one technological device.

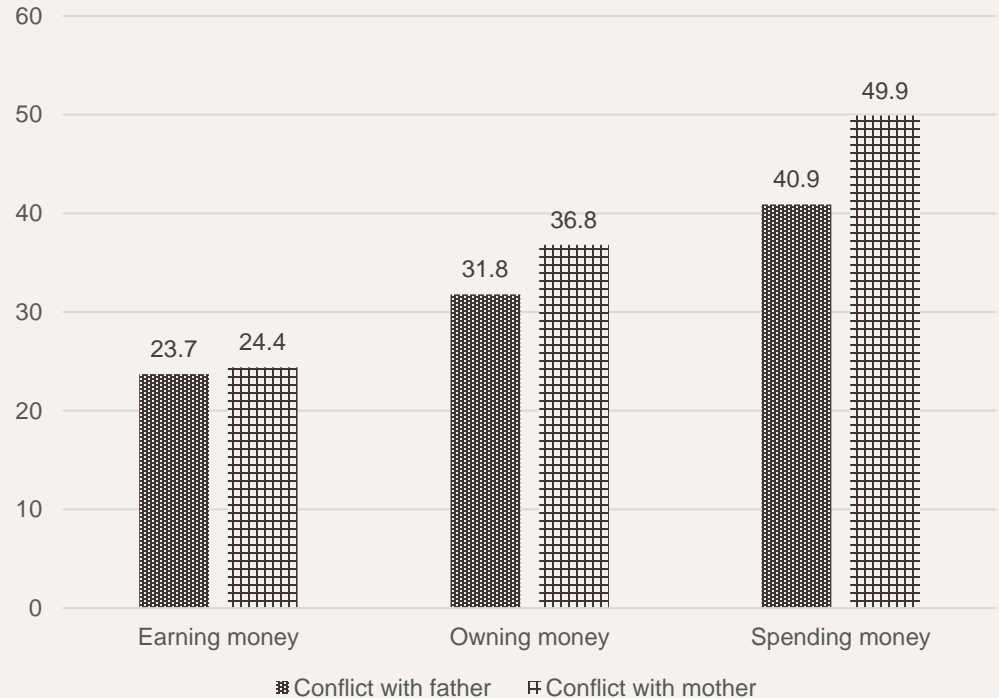

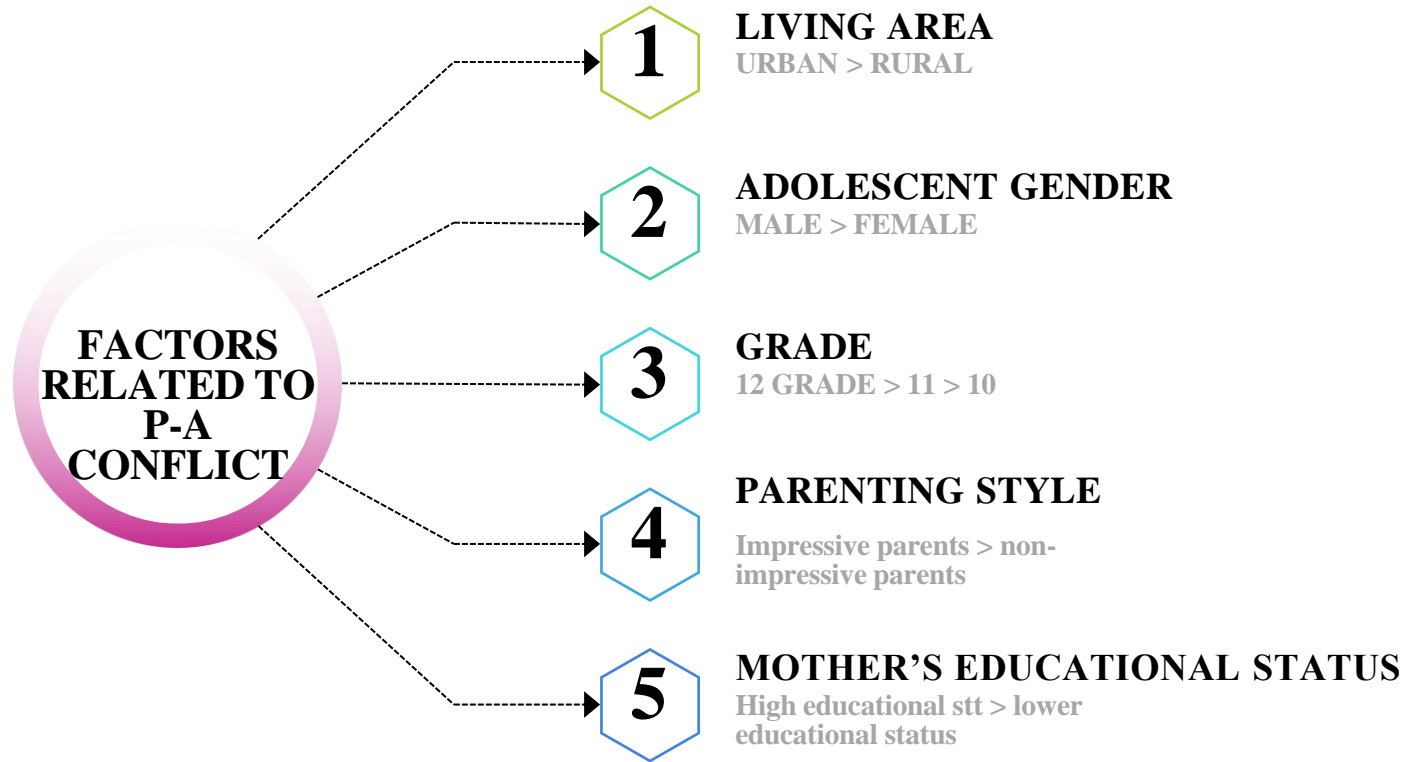

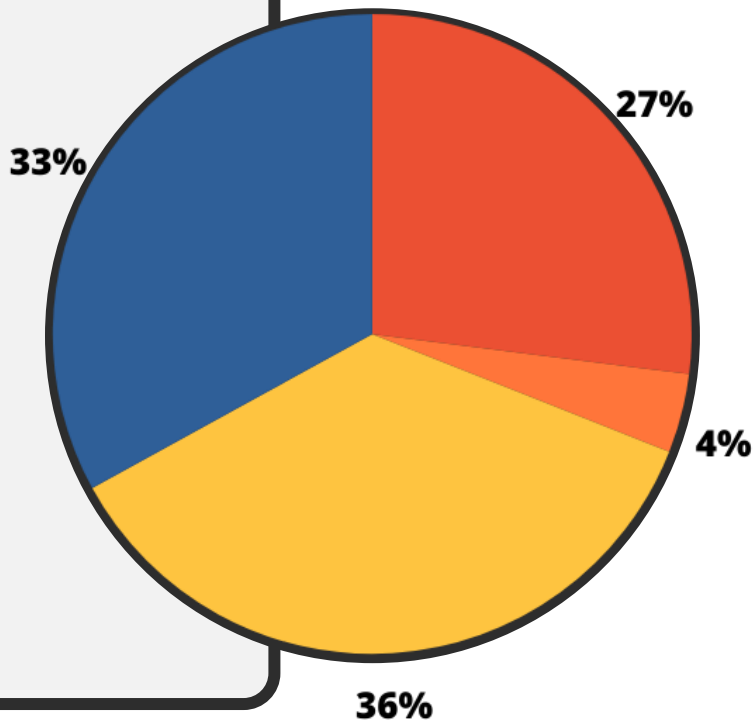
3.1 Conflict consequences





3.2 How adolescents and parents resolve their conflict?

- 36% resolving conflicts in consensus
- 33% avoid
- 27% obey to parents
- 4% of parents follow their adolescents' decision



IV. CONCLUSION

Studying and using the Internet is the topic that causes the most conflicts. Adolescents often experience more conflicts with their mothers than with their fathers. The rate of conflicts between parents and children in urban areas, among males, and in families with imposing parents is higher. The common method of resolving conflicts is through consensus. There are differences in conflict resolution methods based on gender, living area, and the nature of the conflict.

The consequences of conflicts are twofold. However, the group experiencing negative manifestations primarily consists of females, those in urban areas, and those from imposing families, with variations based on the characteristics of the conflict.

Some suggestions for further research:

- Research content: manifestations of conflict, methods of conflict resolution, etc.
 - Method: paired study of parent-child conflicts.
