# Real per capita household incomes increased across all deciles over the last decade

The strongest growth was experienced by lower- and middle-income households



## Income inequality is at its lowest in two decades


 The Gini coefficient decreased from a peak of 0.482 (0.439) in 2007 to 0.433 (0.371) in 2023 before (and after) taxes and transfers



### Preschool enrolment has risen

Over 9 in 10 children aged 3-6 are enrolled in preschool

#### Singapore's lower-income does better relative to those in other countries: Children from disadvantaged backgrounds have opportunities to succeed

# ...but we are seeing some early signs of slowing social mobility amidst an increasingly challenging environment



"In the past we mostly had older folks staying in our rental flats; nowadays we see more families with young children staying in these flats, and they are there for longer durations too."

"We want to ensure that no family in Singapore gets trapped in a permanent underclass. That means we have to do more to help – not just the parents, but also ensure their children have access to full and fair opportunities early in life.



### Our taxes and transfers are also progressive and redistributive


### Lower-income households in Singapore receive \$4 in benefits for every dollar of tax paid.






# To empower families to achieve social mobility requires more than financial assistance

#### Moving beyond financial assistance

- Families may face complex and interlocking difficulties, and support must be proactive, integrated and holistic
- Moving out of poverty takes time, and supporting them for longer can increase their chances of success
- We can make a greater impact by partnering with and galvanising the Community



We have moved beyond just providing episodic assistance for basic living expenses, to **journeying** alongside families over the longer term and **supplementing** their efforts to achieve stability, self-reliance, and eventually social mobility.

# ComLink – a shift from episodic, short-term assistance, towards longer-term, family-centric support

- Community Link (or ComLink) started with the aim of uplifting lower-income families with children towards stability, self-reliance, and social mobility
- Rolled out nationwide in 2021, covering 21 ComLink communities

 Families able to rely on their own resources and abilities to provide for themselves
 Families take stronger ownership in charting life goals and plans

**STABILITY** 

Families have food, shelter, and well-managed health conditions, and are in stable employment











# Family coaches are critical in coaching, motivating and journeying with these families over the long-term

MSF will be deploying around **300 family coaches** to support families on ComLink+.



Family coaches, are equipped to work with ComLink+ families to **co-develop action plans**, and **coach** and **motivate** them towards achieving their goals.

Family coaches will also **take the lead to coordinate support** for families across
multiple programmes, to help families better
navigate social support services.

Adopting a **tailored training approach**, to equip FCs to effectively support and address the diverse needs of ComLink+ families.

# Family coaches will introduce ComLink+ Progress Packages to provide additional financial support to families who do their part to improve their life outcomes

The Packages aim to multiply the impact of families' efforts to improve their longer-term outcomes, and will be trialled for three years.

- Family coaches will offer families ComLink+ Packages that are relevant to the family's goals in the
  areas of preschool, employment, debt clearance, and home ownership.
- When **families take active steps towards these goals**, the packages will provide **financial top-ups** beyond what is needed for basic needs, to:
- Ease short-term pressures families face and allow them to focus on longer-term goals
- Motivate families to sustain progress on their action plan, co-developed with family coaches
- Enable families to **build and strengthen their foundation** to achieve the 3S

### We will also extend ComLink+ to more lower-income families

- From Mar 2024, and over the next 3 years, we will extend support to another 3,000 lower-income families that are not in public rental housing but are eligible for KidSTART or support under the UPLIFT Community Network
- These families face similar challenges as our ComLink+ families and would also benefit from family coach support and the ComLink+ Progress Packages.



# We will track families' progress and review the effectiveness of the ComLink+ model

 We will track ComLink+ families' progress towards the 3S outcomes of stability, self-reliance, and social mobility, across the six domains:













We are also working with local academics to evaluate the effectiveness of the ComLink+ Progress Packages
as incentives in nudging positive behaviours.

### **Ground sensing informs policy and practice**

- As we journey over time with ComLink+ families, our Social Service Offices and family coaches provide a sense of the unmet needs in the community and resultantly helps to:
  - Inform funding for Social Service Agencies (SSAs)
    / ground-ups that run programmes that meet
    these needs;
  - Shape our engagements with Corporate and Community Partners, as we seek their assets and skillsets (e.g. Financial / Digital Literacy workshops) to complement programmes run by the Government / SSAs / ground-ups; and



# The role of the community multiplies our efforts in ComLink+ implementation



### Families must do their part to reap the benefits of the Packages

Progress Packages	Action that family must take	Financial top-ups that family will receive
Package 1: Preschool	<ul> <li>Ensure child is enrolled in preschool in the year he/she turns 3</li> </ul>	One-off \$500 top-up to child's Child Development Account (CDA)
	<ul> <li>Ensure child attends preschool regularly from ages 3-6</li> </ul>	■ \$200 top-up to child's CDA for every quarter of good attendance (≥75% attendance)
Package 2: Employment	<ul> <li>Secure and/or sustain CPF- paying job that pays ≥ \$1,600 per month</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Combination of cash and CPF payouts of \$450 to \$550 for each working adult, for every quarter of CPF-paying employment. If 2 adults are working, each will receive \$50 more per quarter</li> </ul>
Package 3: Debt Clearance	<ul> <li>Repay debts owed to licensed companies</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>1:1 matched debt repayment – for every \$1 that family repays to creditors, donors will pay</li> <li>\$1 directly to creditors.</li> </ul>
Package 4: Home Ownership	<ul> <li>Make voluntary contributions to CPF</li> </ul>	2:1 matched CPF contribution – for every \$1 of voluntary contributions to CPF made by family, \$2 top-up will be made to same member's/members' CPF-Ordinary Account

# With ComLink+, we expect families to take small but sure steps towards Stability, Self-reliance, and Social Mobility over the longer-term

ComLink+ families typically face complex challenges across multiple domains. Uplifting them will take time.

Family coaches will partner families that are willing to make progress on their action plan so as to improve their circumstances over time.

# We are looking for volunteer befrienders to support ComLink+ families

#### **Volunteer Befriender**

Volunteer befrienders will be paired with a Family Coach and play a complementary role by:

- Spending time with the families, building rapport, working with them on their action plans, and encouraging them towards their long-term aspirations and goals;
- Supporting family coaches in making referrals to schemes and services that are relevant to the families; and
- Working with families in more specific ways, such as tutoring or providing basic financial literacy knowledge, if they feel able to, given their skills and experience.




# Even as the Government increases social spending, community giving will help us do more to assist and empower lower-income families

### **Existing partnerships with corporates**



**DBS** began conducting financial literacy programmes for ComLink families in 2022, providing volunteer trainers, facilitators and in-kind sponsorship of class materials to run the programmes.

DBS is scaling up the partnership, leveraging its skillsets and assets to help families in a range of ways:

- **Donations:** Generous donation of over \$30M to fully support the community-funded portion of the *ComLink+ Packages for Preschool and Home Ownership*.
- Befriending: 400 DBS staff are progressively being trained and matched as volunteer befrienders to adopt 200 families in Ang Mo Kio, Yishun, Boon Lay, Taman Jurong, Bedok, Geylang Serai, Hougang, Sengkang and Serangoon. Befrienders will leverage their financial literacy knowledge throughout the befriending experience.
- **Programme co-creation:** Training MSF SSO family coaches on financial literacy & more.
